"I'm especially interested in the 20 mile-per-hour bill (HB 1217) and HB 1700, which relates to the design standards as a complement to Complete Streets and better bicycle/ pedestrian design," said Blake. "These issues tie into my interest in broadening the toolboxes of individual municipalities to make safer streets for all roadway users."

As the father of a 9-month-old daughter, Blake feels even more inspired to promote safe and accessible transportation options for all Washingtonians. The Bicycle Alliance's work to implement Safe Routes to School statewide and to promote active transportation are also

priorities for him. Blake believes there are opportunities to improve urban and rural cycling, and to strengthen the link between cycling and economic development. He's excited to be a part of making these opportunities

Blake holds a master's degree in environmental policy and planning from the University of Washington. Prior to joining the Bicycle Alliance, he worked for Triangle Associates as a facilitator on often contentious planning and policy issues in Washington state. His role there included the design and implementation of public involvement in large public works projects. He also served on the leadership team of the Streets for All Seattle campaign, which has worked over the past 18 months to seek additional funding for walking, biking and transit.

"Blake is well known in the Seattle area where he has honed his considerable transportation skills as chair of the Bicycle Advisory Board and on various bicycle-related funding campaigns," said executive director Barbara Culp. "Besides his transportation acumen, Blake has mediated sensitive environmental issues and knows how to bring all parties to a consensus. He knows when to be tough and when to be a team player. He's a welcome addition to the Bicycle Alliance staff and its vision of a bike-friendly Washington."

Blake grew up on Vashon Island and has generational roots that stretch into eastern Washington. He and his family live in Seattle where he rides his bike often for transportation. When he's not occupied with parental responsibilities, he enjoys camping around the state and spending time with his friends.

State & Federal **Transportation Funding UPDATE**

Heading into the fall, the Bicycle Alliance continues to track the following national and state transportation funding discussions that affect bicycling.

In July, the U.S. House of Representatives Transportation Committee led by Rep. John Mica (R-FL) issued its initial \$230 billion proposal for the long-awaited 6-year transportation spending bill. Mica's proposal represents a 30% decrease in funding from the previous 6-year package, and many active transportation commentators noted its focus on roads and highways. Programs at risk in the House transportation proposal include safe routes to schools and dedicated investments for walking and biking.

The U.S. Senate proposal — a two-year package to maintain transport funding at current levels – has not been reconciled with the House version. Given recent divisiveness in Washington DC, agreement may be distant.

The state's own version of a transportation funding package officially began in July as Governor Gregoire convened the Connecting Washington Taskforce to review statewide transportation needs and to recommend the most promising investment options and revenue sources needed to address these priorities.

Paralleling the Connecting Washington Taskforce effort. the Bicycle Alliance of Washington has teamed up with the Transportation for Washington Campaign — a coalition made up of health, faith, environmental, labor, business, and public office communities — to support a more balanced state transportation investment package that emphasizes public health and safety, as well as funding for biking, walking, and transit.

Finally, Initiative 1125 on this year's November ballot would negatively restrict the revenue tools available in Washington state. The initiative would prevent the state legislature from changing the law to allow tolls collected on one bridge or highway to be used for another. It also would make the legislature approve any toll changes, and it would abolish variable toll pricing. If passed, these toll revenue guidelines could reduce Washington's options for new transportation investments.

2012 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES SET

The Bicycle Alliance board approved a set of 2012 legislative priorities as recommended by the Legislative & Statewide Issues Committee. Our agenda will include:

- Continued support of HB1700, which carries over from 2011 and would encourage higher-quality bike and pedestrian facilities by allowing greater flexibility in design standards.
- Continued support of HB1217, which would give cities and counties the authority to establish 20 mph zones on some non-arterial streets to lower accident rates and protect vulnerable users.
- Work with other non-profits to support a transportation funding package called Transportation 4 Washington.
- Work with the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and others to support funding for the Complete Streets bill passed in
- Use 2012-2013 to see if there is support for a 3- to 5-foot safe passing bill and, if so, build a coalition of support.

SAFE ROUTES ROUNDUP

Statewide Trainings

September often signals the start of the school year. For us, it signals another round of physical education teachertrainings on our Bike and Pedestrian Safety Education curriculum. This fall we will be training over 80 middle school PE teachers at more than 12 trainings all over the state. During these two-day trainings, teachers learn safety skills for walking and biking on roads, assessment tools to identify safe routes, and how to teach our 8-lesson curriculum. Several other districts will be kicking off the school year teaching the curriculum in their grades 5 to 8 physical education classes. This will help students be capable of biking and walking safely to school, to parks, and for fun. By the end of the 2011-2012 school year, we anticipate over 20,000 students in grades 5-8 will have gone through our curriculum. That's an impact!

South King County Project

Nearly 400 kids in South King County have been trained on safe walking and biking skills. This was possible only through the help of Bike Alliance volunteers, funding from King County, and assistance from Raleigh's Diamondback Bicycles, REI, and Recycled Cycles. Dedicated volunteers delivered the bikes to schools and pitched in to help with the lessons when the PE teachers needed a hand.

We've been leading the districts in safe routes conversations, and have arranged guest speakers from SVR consulting and the King County Target Zero Task Force. The focus for the next couple of months will be on coaching the schools through the encouragement events, finalizing safe routes to schools plans, and finishing up the last walking audits. We have also been pursuing funding opportunities to help the districts continue and expand this work.

We are always looking for volunteers who are interested in helping us move the bikes Safe Routes to School Train-the-Trainer from school to school, fix student bikes. or help PE teachers with the PE class drills.

Go By Bike

Our Go By Bike program staff has worked with the four collaborating colleges and two elementary schools in King, Kitsap, Pierce and Snohomish counties to tailor individualized programs for each of the populations served by the schools. This customization will continue as the programs are developed, instructors are trained, and curricula are developed and delivered. Staff recently held instructor trainings at Bellevue College and will continue with instructor development at all participating colleges.

We are moving through a procurement process to acquire loaner bikes for participants of the on-bike portions of these programs. This process is slower than hoped for, but we are making consistent progress. The Bicycle Alliance of Washington anticipates delivering the first round of programming at each institution by spring 2012 at the latest.

Connecting the Dots in Vancouver Annual Bicycle Permit Eliminated By Eric Giacchino

Backed by a growing group of incredible volunteers, Clark County Cycling Coalition (C-4) hit the streets and bikeways this summer. In June they wrapped up a two-week bicycle safety course at two Vancouver middle schools, with over 350 students participating.

C-4 also organized several family oriented rides for Pedalpalooza and provided staffed bike parking at some major community events like the Fort Vancouver Fourth of July Celebration and the popular Six to Sunset Concert Series. C-4 also participated in the Washington State School for the Blind tandem ride and doubled the number of tandems that rode last year. This fun event represented a way to reach out to a group of kids who might not otherwise have the chance to ride a bike.

I've noticed a marked increase in both new and veteran cyclists around Vancouver this year. I don't know if it's the cost of fuel, the desire to stay fit, or simply the enjoyment of riding, but the outpouring of support only proves the area has gone far too long without a central, uniting voice for bicycling issues. C-4 will continue to gain momentum and connect the dots of the individual efforts—becoming the "hub" for bicyclists and cycling issues in this area.

FOR STATE FERRIES

The State Transportation Commission voted to eliminate the ferry system's annual bicycle permit – allowing passengers who pay with monthly passes, multi-ride cards, or the ORCA ePurse to bring bicycles on board without charge. In the San Juan Islands, only passengers using multi-ride cards are exempt from a bicycle surcharge.

Existing bicycle surcharges will still apply when traveling using single fare tickets.

Also under review is another change to procedures at the Coleman Dock: cyclists would be required to enter the parking pier via a new gate to be built near the car fare booths. At a meeting earlier this summer, Washington State Ferry officials agreed to consult representatives from Squeaky Wheels and the Bicycle Alliance about bicycle loading on the dock on behalf of the hundreds of cyclists who commute daily between Bainbridge Island and Seattle.

Congratulations to Marcus Whitman Elementary School in Richland for being selected as the 3 Rivers Bicycle Coalition's first Safe Routes to School Program. 3RBC will work with the school to conduct an audit of their needs. The coalition's goal is to improve the level of walking and bicycling to school in the Tri-Cities region.
